Clinic staff, led by Dr. Alison Spencer and Cynthia Gallegos, RN, has been working on identifying methods to improve the immunization rates of Nisqually children from ages 11 through 18. Improvements were addressed through a Policy, Systems, and Environment change process approach. They have demonstrated significant improvements in immunizing adolescents in numerous areas.


This targeted work was made possible through a grant from the Office of Immunizations, administered and managed by the American Indian Health Commission for Washington State. The Nisqually Tribe was one of only two Tribes that received grant funding for an adolescent immunization project.

Childhood immunization rates have been identified as a target for needed improvement at the federal and state level, and have been and continue to be measured through the Indian Health Services quality improvement system (GPRA) that most of our Northwest Tribes, including the Nisqually Tribe utilize to track improvement.



Congratulations to the Medical Clinic on a great job well done!


11 - 18 Year Olds Tdap & Meningococcal Vaccines
